of fewer than 100 words per page -- the print size looks like a children's book. (In case you're not clear how few words per page that is, this review is more than 250 words so would be 2-1/2 pages long in this book.) Worse, most of the budget travel tips are generic rather than Iceland-specific. You could easily find them with a Google search for "budget travel tips" but here's a summary: use an ATM card with minimal charges to change money; stay in hostels rather than hotels or try couch surfing; buy food in supermarkets and cook it yourself in your hostel; BYOB rather than drinking in bars; take the bus or bum a ride from the airport with another traveler rather than taking a taxi from the airport; split rental car costs with other people. **IF YOU HAVE ZERO BUDGET TRAVEL EXPERIENCE WHATSOEVER**, this pamphlet (it doesn't really merit the term "book") **MIGHT** possibly enlighten you with a few helpful ideas (although, again, you could get the same thing for free with a Google search). If that doesn't describe you, then let me do you a favor and satisfy you with a spoiler of the one interesting tidbit you'll learn that's actually about Iceland: hot dogs, introduced by US GIs, are a popular budget food item that can be purchased in gas stations.
