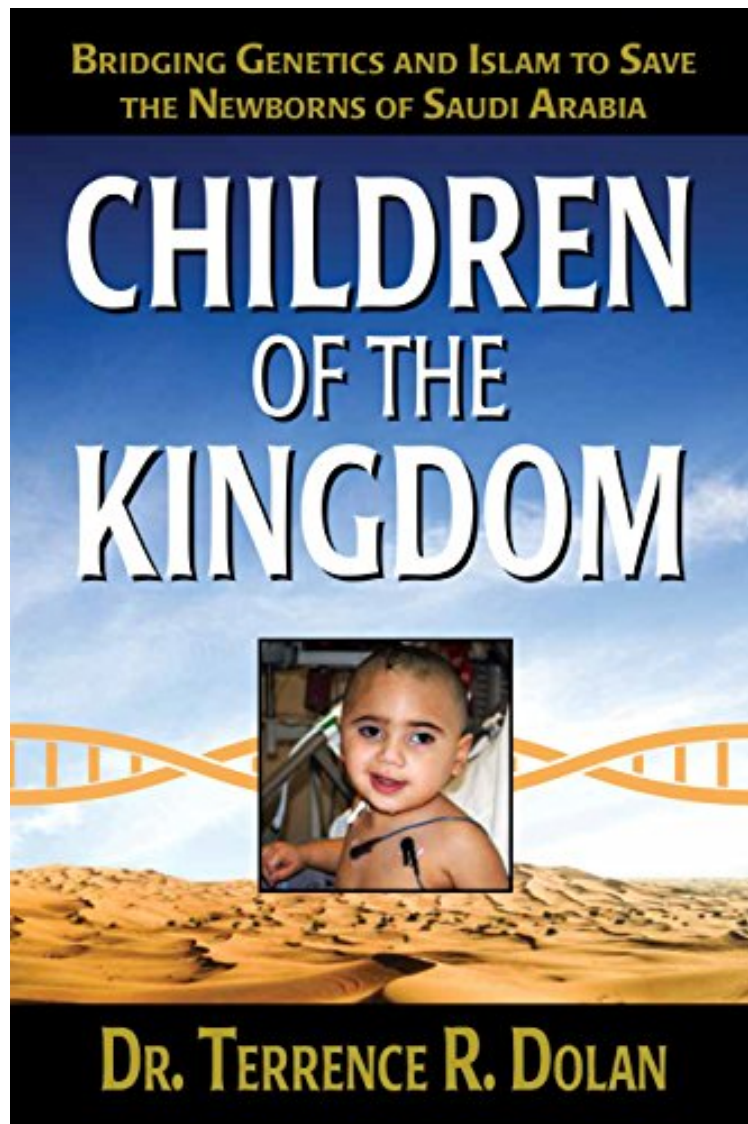

I had been a professor, a neuroscientist, and the director of a research center for so long it had been decades since I was uncertain about my path. Then the phone rang and my life changed. It was an executive search firm. A substantive and reputable international entity needed help with a major, long-term health research project critical to the children of its nation and I had been pinpointed as one of the best people in the world capable of addressing their problem. I couldn't then imagine the scope or scale of the new adventure that awaited me. *Children of the Kingdom* is my memoir, travelogue, and science current events story concerning a Middle-Eastern society in transition, the intrigue of an oil-rich monarchy maintaining a precarious balance with its country's religious extremists, the passions that naturally swirl around ancient cultural traditions, and emerging genetic science. We need many more like it. -- --Timothy Shriver, Chairman, Special Olympics International About the Author Dr. Terry Dolan received his B.A. in Psychology from Dakota Wesleyan University in Mitchell, S.D., in 1962 and a Ph.D. in Psychology and Physiology at the University of Texas Austin in 1966. After four years of post-doctoral research and training at the Center for Neural Sciences at Indiana University, he began a 36-year academic career in research and science administration. Among his positions were Director of the Parmsly Hearing Institute at Loyola University in Chicago, as well as a Professor in the Psychology Department and the Assistant Dean of the Graduate School. In 1976 he became Program Director in the Behavioral and Neural Sciences at the National Science Foundation in Washington, D.C. He spent 1977-78 as a Von Humboldt Scholar at the Neurophysiology Institute at the University of Erlangen Nuremberg in Germany. In 1982, Dr. Dolan became the Director of the Waisman Center at the University of Wisconsin Madison and under his tutelage the center became one of the largest research centers in the world on human development and developmental disabilities. At UW Madison he held professorial appointments in the Departments of Neurology, Neurophysiology, and Psychology. While at the Waisman Center, Dolan was elected President of the Association of Mental Retardation Research Centers in the United States, the President of the American Association of University Programs for People with Disabilities, and the President of the International Association for the Scientific Study of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities. While President of the IASSIDD, the organization expanded membership into 76 countries. In 2001, after 20 years at the helm of the Waisman Center, Dr. Dolan was recruited by the Royal Family of Saudi Arabia, namely Prince Sultan bin Salman bin Abdul Aziz, to develop a national research and treatment center on childhood diseases and disabilities for Saudi Arabia. The incidence of profound childhood diseases in the Middle East is approximately 15 to 20 times greater than that found in Western cultures, a problem of nearly epidemic proportions. The Prince Salman Center for Disability Research is now the only center of its kind in the Middle East outside of Israel. Under his directorship, and the subsequent collaboration and continuation of the directorship by Dr. Steven Schroeder, the Center developed both intramural and extramural research programs, many of which continue. Approximately 200 scientists from the United States and Europe were involved in peer review or other activities associated with the center. Among other simultaneous activities during his career, Dr. Dolan was the

Personal Science Advisor to Eunice Kennedy-Shriver for the 15 years prior to her death. In the mid-1990s he traveled with Sargent Shriver to the Soviet Union to start Special Olympics there a very successful enterprise. He has been a member or advisor of the Executive Board of the Kennedy Foundation, Best Buddies International, International Special Olympics, and the Advisory Council of the Air Force Office of Scientific Research, as well as a National Science Foundation representative to the National Institute on Neurological Diseases and Health and the National Eye Institute at the National Institutes of Health. Dr. Dolan and his wife Mary Ann Mechtenberg Dolan have four children and seven grandchildren and live in Glenview, IL.
