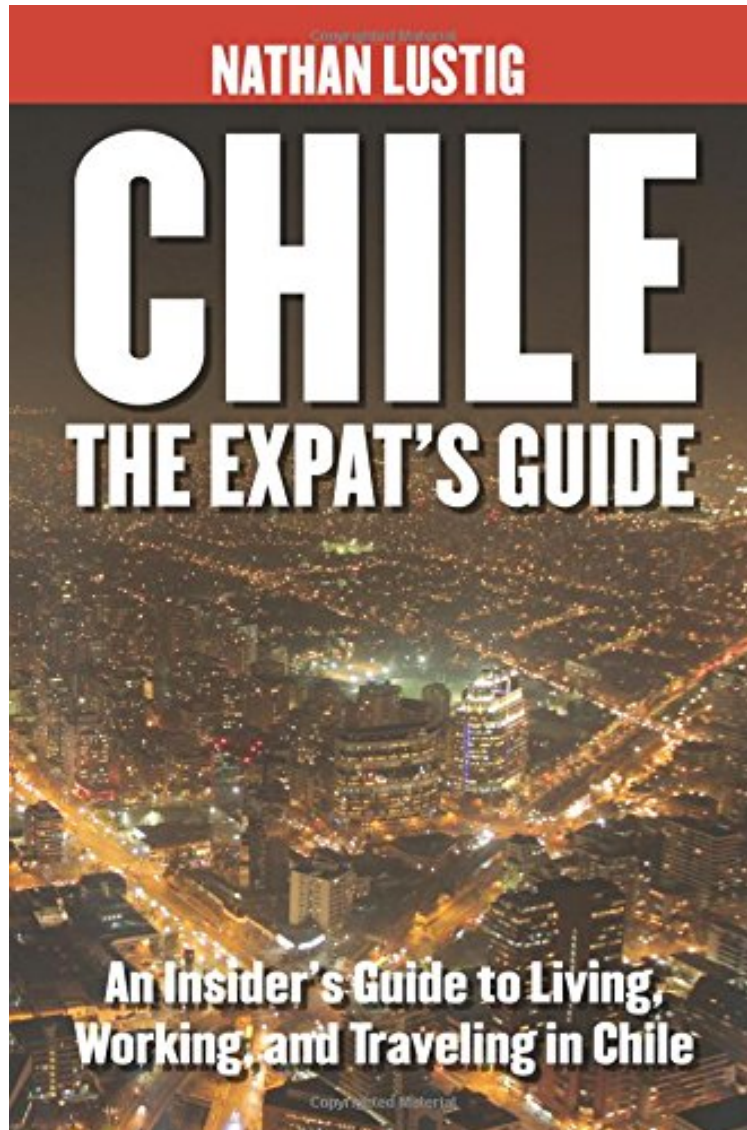


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Chile: The Expat's Guide: An Insiders Guide to Living, Working Traveling in Chile

The text covers all bases, from the practical, legal, and bureaucratic, to the cultural and sociological, with even some geographic and historical rundowns thrown in the mix. Also, the information is to-the-point and well organized, and the eBook as a whole follows a logical, structured format. The only negatives I found: a surprising number of grammatical issues and typos, plus some profanity that struck me as out of place in such a book.
