I also agree with a previous reviewer's statement that the story about the Englishman alone was worth the price I paid for the book. If you're looking for an overview of the dialects of the Levant, than this is a perfect book in my opinion. It's easy to digest, yet covers the basics of grammar, idioms, terms of address, even some mild slang, greetings, general conversation, etc., and all in a small easy to use format. By the end of the book you'll be able to read a short story in Levantine and understand basic conversations, which is all the book claims to do. People are expecting some comprehensive course from a beginning level book, if you want something more advanced try the Syrian Reference grammar and Dictionary by Georgetown, or a more advanced Levantine coursebook. However, for self-study and an enjoyable overview of the dialects of the Levant I highly recommend this title.
