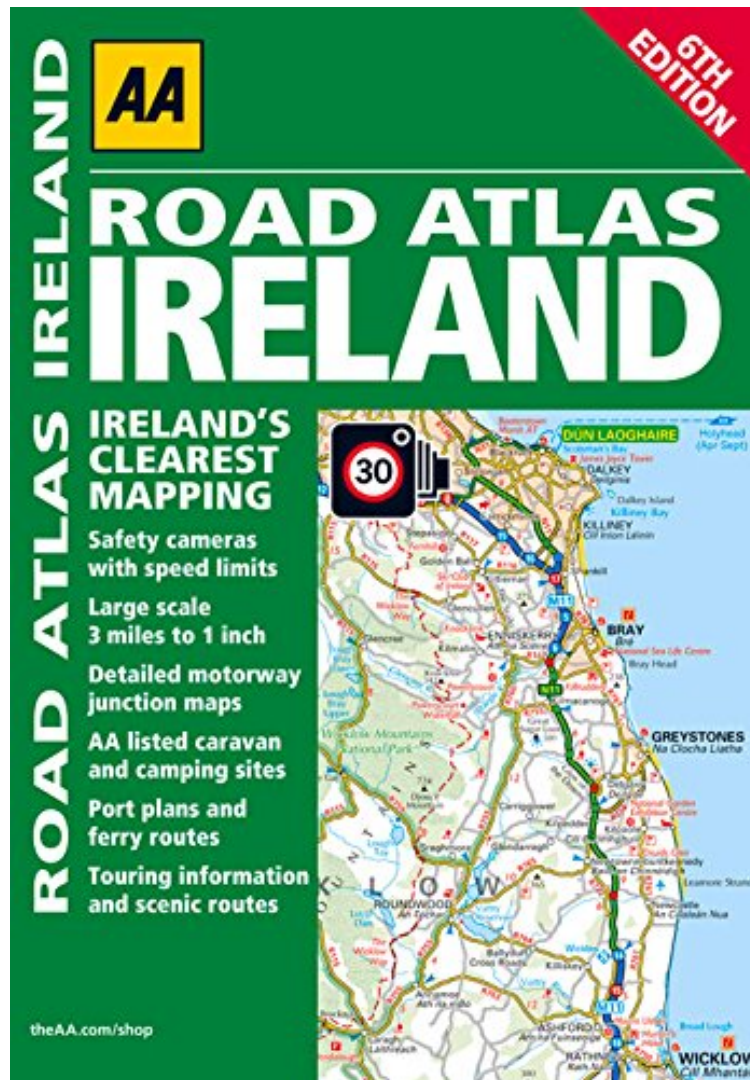

GPS's will take you on the shortest distant route despite changing settings to "fastest" or "use motorways". As such, you'll end up on A and B roads that make your one car driveway look like interstates. In any case, this map had every road in Ireland that the GPS could find for us. Even tiny alleys behind pubs that had no business being on a map like this could be found in the book. We could be completely in the backroads of the country, and always you can find yourself if you can find your landmarks and last

known motorway. Super important point is that there is an Irish index in the back. Sometimes you will encounter parts of Ireland such as the Dingle Peninsula where signs, streets, and towns are labeled only in Irish (called Gaeltacht regions). This makes the Irish index super useful while visiting those. 3 of 3 people found the following review helpful. The atlas was a great supplement to the TomTom that came with our Hertz rental car booked through Easy Tour Ireland (which I highly recommend). Having just returned from 10 days driving around Eire, the map was dead on. Except for towns and cities - no street signs in Ireland, although the roads between A and B are well marked, and the roundabouts surprisingly negotiable. We also used via the internet the AA mapquest program, which was also great (except for the towns). Use this map. Also get "Ireland for Dummies" - no color pix, just great advice.

Plus, there are motorway strip maps detailing all of Ireland's motorway junctions.
